Key achievements to date:	Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:
	-On the advice of our school governing board, the school has ceased attending swimming lessons at Creative Aquatic in Tytherington. Our subject lead HLTA is investigating other providers in the area and will present her findings and recommendations to the Headteacher before the end of July 19.  -Key Indicator 3 will be addressed as an ongoing focus. Our subject HLTA is astill studying the Level 5 Certificate in Primary Physical Education Specialism. Once complete, the PE curriculum will be reviewed, updated and rewritten in line with best practice and focussed on our new school values.  -In an attempt to reduce sedentary behaviour and embed increased physical activity into the culture and structure of the federation, our focus until 2020 is the effective use of outdoor space throughout the school day.  -Some children fully understand the benefits of being physically active, but still choose not to fully engage in PE lessons or active play at lunchtime. This is something to investigate further in 2019/20.
